Overview - When UT became state, 1/64 of state was set aside for school use. Utah has done land trades and leases much of the land. They lease the lands to companies, take the interest from these endeavors and give it back to the schools. The money grows every year. The long term goal is for this money to eventually pay for all school expenses.

Funding this year - Trustland Budget is about \$111,000 (expenses below \$108,400) **Trustland 2021-22 uses:** 

- Paying for Language Arts teacher's salary so we can have smaller class sizes.
   (approx.\$78,000)
- ELL kids are struggling so we opted last year to use this year's money for ELL aid. We
  have created staff boards so we can identify the kids that are not proficient, we do
  interventions, and are seeing success in proficiency. Goal is to increase this proficiency
  with the ELL aid. (approx \$5,400)
- Wellness center- Wellness Center Aid For tier 1 interventions. If a student is struggling, they can go down to the Wellness Center for 10 minutes and do a decompression activity. Then they are then sent back to class. This has saved the counselors hours of time and has helped student behaviors. Wellness aid is wonderful at tracking the students and helping them calm down, and get back on task. As a teacher, Dustin has witnessed this first hand. The program is working and really helps to de-escalate students, even when they arrive at school in an agitated state. When they return from the Wellness Center, they are ready to work. (approx \$25,000)

School has a 2nd source of funding called TSSA. Budget is about \$142,000 (expenses below \$ TSSA 2021-22 uses:

- ELL aid, SPED aid, and Behavior Tech. aid to work with mild to moderate students.(approx. 31,000)
- At the beginning of the year, we ended up with about 70 more students that were projected. We were able to hire new teachers to be able to spread kids out and cut class size (approx \$25,000). The class sizes were still too big, so we are using this money to pay for teachers to teach during their "prep hour", an extra 4 class periods, MA 6 & 7, Art, SC6. (approx \$43,200). This has helped to reduce class size

- Computer Tech. Specialist who has a highly qualified skillset and has saved us thousands of dollars each year in technology. Every teacher has a classroom set of chromebooks in their room, one for every student. We pay a portion of his salary in order to keep him full time. (approx \$3,800)
- Occasionally we use TSSA to pay for substitutes so teacher teams can meet together and collaborate and discuss data (approx. \$6,000).

We are in need of teacher computers, and also a couple classroom sets of chromebooks to replace old ones which are nearing end of life. We have another funding source that we think may pay for the teacher computers! (Teacher computer replacement costs estimated \$36,000, Chromebook Cost estimated \$9,000 per classroom set)

Another thing the school has, is a full time resource officer that helps keep our school safe. We also participate in Life Launch University activities which help students learn skills to develop successful skills to succeed in life.
