#### Why Does Attendance Matter?

At Hurricane Intermediate, regular attendance is crucial for student success both academically and socially. Here are some important reasons why being in school every day makes a difference:

<u>Higher Achievement:</u> Students who attend school regularly are more likely to achieve higher grades and better test scores. Research shows that students who miss 10% or more of school time are at significant risk of falling behind.

<u>Stronger Social Connections:</u> Being in school helps students build relationships with peers and teachers. Missing school can create gaps in social interactions, making it harder to stay engaged.

<u>Career Success:</u> Good attendance habits developed in school carry over to the workplace. Studies have shown that employees with strong attendance records are more likely to succeed in their careers.

<u>Dropout Risk:</u> Students who miss a lot of school are more likely to drop out before finishing high school. Missing just two days per month can add up to a full month of lost learning each year.

To further emphasize attendance, punctuality is key to maintaining a smooth and productive learning environment. To reinforce the importance of arriving on time, we'd like to remind everyone of our updated **Tardy Policy**:

### **Tardy Policy Updates**

To encourage punctuality and responsibility, the following consequences will be enforced for students with multiple tardies outside of 1st period:

**5 Tardies**: A conference will be held with the students, and they will be assigned 1-3 days of Lunchtime PAWS.

**10 Tardies:** Students will receive 3 days of Lunchtime PAWS.

**15 Tardies:** Students will receive 3-5 days of Lunchtime PAWS. .

**20 Tardies:** Students will spend 1-2 days in the PAWS Room and a student/parent meeting will be held.

## Is there a bat in your school?

Here's what you need to know







Bats usually just want to be left alone. You cannot get rabies from just seeing a bat or being in a room with one.

Never touch a bat or any other wild animal

If you try to touch a bat, it might bite you in self-defense.

A bat that is on the floor or cannot fly is more likely than other bats to have rabies.



### Ouickly tell a teacher or school offical

The safest thing you can do after you find a bat is to tell a teacher.

Don't approach it or touch it. Don't pet it, catch it, comfort it, kick it aside, or try to shoo it away.

Stay away from it and contact an adult.

If you are bitten or come in direct contact with a bat, don't wait. Tell an adult immediately and see a doctor. The treatment after a bite is simple and effective.

Bats in Utah often use building structures as a place to rest or find safety. Because bats are the most common source for rabies in Utah, it is important for school districts and students to better understand the risk of rabies and what to do when you find a bat on school grounds.

Rabies is a viral disease that affects the nervous system and infection is nearly always fatal after symptoms appear. If someone is exposed to rabies through a bite or scratch from a rabid animal, they can get <u>medication</u> to stop them from getting the infection. The medication only works if they get it before symptoms start.

Rabid bats may look and act normal or may show signs of illness, which include being active during the day or laying on the ground, unable to fly. A bite or scratch from a bat may not always be visible. The most important thing to do if you find a bat on school grounds, is to not touch, pet, feed, or try to catch the bat.

Bat exposures in schools can result in a lot of students and staff getting the rabies postexposure prophylaxis (PEP), extensive investigations conducted by the health department, and costly medicines. These circumstances can be prevented with the following safety measures:

- Teachstudentstonevertouchabat.
- Encouragestudentstotellateacheroradultimmediatelyiftheyseeabatontheground or flying around inside a building.
- Encouragestudentstotellateacher/adultimmediatelyiftheycomeintocontactwitha bat. A potential exposure can be a bite or scratch or bat saliva entering an open wound.
- Ifsomeoneisbittenorscratchedbyabat,seekmedicaltreatmentimmediately,and notify the <u>Southwest Utah Public Health Department</u> to report the exposure and discuss next steps. Confirm whether other students or staff came into contact with the bat.
- Close-offtheareawherebatsarereportedtomakesuremorestudentsandstaffarenot exposed.
- Contactyourlo<u>calanimalcontrolorDivisionofWildlifeResources(DWR)</u>tosafely remove the bat from the premises.
- Ifthebatcannotbecapturedbyaprofessional,followCDC'sguidelinesonhowtosafely capture a bat. If a person or pet has been exposed to a bat and the bat is still in the area, it is useful to collect the bat for rabies testing. A negative test result can help prevent costly rabies treatment. Contact the <a href="health department">health department</a> to coordinate rabies testing (done at the Utah Public Health Laboratory). If no one was exposed to the bat, the bat can be safely released into the wild.
- Ifabatcolonyorlargerbatinfestationisreported,additionalstepswillneedtobetaken to make sure all bats are removed safely, and that more bats cannot enter the building. These steps may include hiring a private pest management company. Discuss these steps with your local DWR representative.
